OUR MISSION

Demonstrating love and compassion in action, Friendship Mission is a refuge for the homeless and hungry, offering shelter for men, women, and children, and assisting ourclients to become self-sufficient.

80 PEOPLE

moved from our shelters to self-sufficiency in 2023. They now have control of their lives.

FRIENDSHIP MISSION GIVES...

Friendship Mission operates two emergency shelters in Montgomery for those who are homeless. In the past year, we provided **28,835** emergency shelter bed nights to **164** men, **115** women, and **55** children. Along with providing food for residents, Friendship Mission also operates a soup kitchen for those who do not live in our shelters but need a prepared meal. In the past year, we have served **66,805** meals between the two shelters and the Soup Kitchen combined. Case management is provided to help residents navigate their personal obstacles and to give guidance as they build a personal plan to self-sufficiency. Friendship Mission also connects its residents to valuable resources that can help them stabilize their lives. From food assistance, income and childcare to medical services and housing, Friendship Mission's team works to ensure residents are confident and steady when they exit our shelter program.

Friendship Mission operates seven days a week to care for those who are experiencing hunger and homelessness. Even during the height of the pandemic, our doors did not close. Homelessness and hunger are problems that plague our community every single day.

The most current data shows that 345 people experienced homelessness in 2023. This is an increase from 2022. We expect the numbers to continue to climb for the unsheltered population due to the lack of resources in our area.



FINANCIAL SNAPSHOT

The funds raised, totaling \$1,255,267.50, were put to meaningful use, directly supporting efforts to assist the homeless and those in need. Contributions from faith communities, grants, individual donors, businesses, and fundraising campaigns all played a pivotal role in sustaining vital services.

With \$276,777.20 allocated to emergency shelter operations, supplies, and food, these funds provided a safe haven for many, ensuring their basic needs were met. Additionally, \$48,508.58 supported the soup kitchen, offering nourishment to those facing hunger. The majority of the expenses, \$894,233.77, were directed towards administrative costs, ensuring the efficient and effective operation of these critical programs.

Overall, every dollar contributed went towards making a real difference in the lives of the homeless, offering them not only immediate relief but also a pathway to a better future.
